European Convention on Human Rights (1950)

Art. 14 Prohibition of discrimination

The enjoyment of the rights and freedoms set forth in this Convention shall be secured without discrimination on any ground such as sex, race, colour, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, association with a national minority, property, birth or other status.



Protocol No. 12 to ECHR (2000)

Art. 1 General prohibition of discrimination

1. The enjoyment of the rights and freedoms <u>set</u> <u>forth by law</u> shall be secured without discrimination on any ground such as sex, race, colour, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, association with a national minority, property, birth or other status.



European Social Charter (revised) (1996)

Part V, Art. E Non-discrimination

The enjoyment of the rights set forth in this Charter shall be secured without discrimination on any ground such as race, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national extraction or social origin, <u>health</u>, association with a national minority, birth or other status.



Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union (2000)

Art. 21 Non-discrimination

Any discrimination based on any ground such as sex, race, colour, <u>ethnic</u> or social <u>origin</u>, <u>genetic</u> <u>features</u>, language, religion or <u>belief</u>, political or any other opinion, membership of a national minority, property, birth, <u>disability</u>, <u>age</u>, or <u>sexual</u> <u>orientation</u> shall be prohibited.





Access to social rights in Europe (2002)

7 types of obstacles:

inadequate ...

- 1. legal provisions;
- 2. enforcement or monitoring;
- 3. resources;
- 4. procedures or management;
- 5. information or communication;
- 6. attention to vulnerable groups or regions.
- 7. Socio-cultural obstacles

UN CRPD

Art. 12 Equal Recognition before the Law

2. States Parties shall recognise that persons with disabilities enjoy legal capacity on an equal with others in all aspects of life.

3. States Parties shall take appropriate measures to provide access by persons with disabilities to the support they may require in exercising their legal capacity.



UN CRPD

Art. 12 Equal Recognition before the Law

4. States Parties shall ensure that all measures that relate to the exercise of legal capacity provide for appropriate and effective safeguards to prevent abuse in accordance with international human rights law. Such safeguards shall ensure that measures relating to the exercise of legal capacity respect the rights, will and preferences of the person, are free of conflict of interest and undue influence, are proportional and tailored to the person's circumstances, apply for the shortest time possible and are subject to regular review by a competent, independent and impartial authority or judicial body. The safeguards shall be proportional to the degree to which such measures affect the person's rights and interests.

Art. 3 General principles

(a) Respect for inherent dignity, individual autonomy including the freedom to make one's own choices, and independence of persons;

Concluding Observations on Art. 12

States Parties must "review the laws allowing for guardianship and trusteeship, and take action to develop laws and policies to replace regimes of substitute decision-making by supported decisionmaking, which respects the person's autonomy, will and preferences."



UN Committee on the rights of persons with disabilities

Draft General Comment on Art. 12 (Sept. 2013)

Art. 12 does not provide additional rights to people with disabilities; it simply describes the specific elements required to ensure the right to equality before the law for people with disabilities on an equal basis with others.



UN Committee on the rights of persons with disabilities

Draft General Comment on Art. 12 (Sept. 2013)

legal capacity ‡ mental capacity the 2 concepts are often conflated

Art. 12 does not permit perceived or actual deficits in mental capacity to be used as justification for denying legal capacity.
