A TOOLKIT FOR PROVIDING SUPPORT TO FIRST LINE HELPERS IN COUNTRIES WITH REFUGEES FROM UKRAINE

ABOUT THE WEBINARS

Rationale: In the emergency of helping the refugees, the first line help is provided by volunteers. Volunteers usually do not have training in psychological/psychiatric subjects but are expected to provide the psychological first aid to refugees. Because of that and the emotional burden of working with persons in crisis situation who lost their homes, jobs, and other close persons, volunteers are also at high risk of secondary traumatisation.

Mental health professionals are usually not involved in the first contact with the refugees, and therefore their role in the acute situation is to provide the education and support to the helpers.

Aim: three webinars will take place in April 2022 to provide the following:

- practical tips on coping with mental health issues for volunteers who provide help to refugees.
- lectures by experienced mental health professionals.
- lecturers and chairs selected from mental health professionals with lived experience on the field from countries with ongoing or recent war events.

Target: This toolkit is aimed to help the volunteers and mental health professionals to support the volunteers who are providing help to refugees in their countries.

Target countries: Ukraine and countries with high numbers of refugees coming from Ukraine: Poland, Moldova, Hungary, Romania, Slovakia and others. The webinars will be made available in those languages at a later stage.
